Beth's remarks at Jacob's Bar Mitzvah:

Last March, you came home and declared that our family was not observant enough. You said that when you were older, you would keep Kosher and wear you Kippah all the time. I remarked, "Ok, that sounds like a good plan." The next day you came home and announced that you didn't want to wait until you were older to be more observant - you wanted to do this now. We talked about guidelines and what this would mean to our family; and secretly Dad and I thought this would last a week, at max, especially since at that time your favorite food was a bacon cheeseburger from Five Guys. But you proved us both wrong. You have been diligent in keeping up with this observance and for this, I am again proud of you. But it's not only the observance of keeping Kosher and wearing your Kippah, but also your interest in learning about the Jewish faith, its culture and its traditions that impresses me. I love hearing about what you've learned and your interpretations of those lessons. Due to this passion, I believe that you will continue to pursue learning opportunities in the shul.

You have truly enjoyed Hebrew School and all of its wonderful teachers! There are many people who have helped you along this journey starting from Ms. Lila and the Story Hour, Ms. Diane and her geography books, Mora Chaia and her fun projects, Mora Miriam and learning Hebrew, Mora Leah and her ties to Israel and Jewish life, Morat Ya'Ashua and his ability to draw out your thoughts about Judaism, Rabbi B. and his guidance through this process and of course Nancy who has nurtured your Jewish education since you were just three years old. You have been very fortunate to have so many wonderful morot/teachers. I am sure they helped to influence your love of learning.

Your love of learning extends into secular school – you have many teachers here today that have witnessed this thirst for knowledge. Their support has also helped you thrive as an individual. Your decision to invite so many of them, from when you were four all the way to your current school, shows your appreciation for their dedication to educating you.

Finally, while this Bar Mitzvah may feel like "an ending" to your Jewish learning, I think that you are only just beginning. I hope you continue to want to learn, to research your roots, to learn to speak Hebrew fluently, and continue to ask questions.
